Conservation Cost-Share Opportunities through McLean County SWCD

Partners for Conservation funds are available for conservation installation that will conserve soil and benefit water quality. This funding pool is available on behalf of the McLean County Soil and Water Conservation District. The funds can be used for projects outside of current practices enrolled in an active government contract. Costshare is based on a practice component list that sets expectations for average costs of installation. Cover crop cost-share is capped at \$3200 per applicant or 75% of total costs, whichever amount is less. It is important to note that applications must be filled out and approved before seed or other project costs occur as payments cannot be made retroactively. Conservation practices include but are not limited to: cover crops 75% cost share up to \$40/ac-3 year maximum, grassed waterway construction 75% cost shared, water well decommissioning 75% cost shared and new adoption of no-till or strip till 75% cost shared. USDA NRCS Fiscal Year 2023 Financial Assistance Program Report

How about some alphabet soup? Or better yet pie? The McLean County NRCS Field Office had a successful year in conservation and financial assistance program funding in FY23. We were able to get funding for 31 new program contracts covering 26,008.4 acres in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), and the Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) which totaled \$2,372,395.77 in new contract obligations. This almost double the amount of funds we received locally in FY22. The majority of the conservation practices in these contracts consist of cover crops, no-till/strip-till, reduced tillage, and nutrient management. If you're interested in getting a piece of the pie now is a great time to start developing a conservation plan with NRCS to compete for future funding opportunities. CRP Open Enrollment Opportunities

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is now accepting applications for the Continuous Conservation Reserve Program (Continuous CRP). USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) encourages agricultural producers and landowners in Illinois who are interested in conservation opportunities for their land in exchange for yearly rental payments to consider the enrollment options available through Continuous CRP, which also includes the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) offered by FSA partners. Additionally, producers participating in CRP can now apply to re-enroll, if their contracts will expire this year. To submit an offer, producers should contact the FSA at their local USDA Service Center by July 31, 2024, in order to have an offer effective by October 1, 2024. To ensure enrollment acreages do not exceed the statutory cap, FSA will accept offers from producers on a first-come, first-served basis and will return offers for approval in



batches throughout the year. Additionally, producers with acres enrolled in Continuous CRP set to expire September 30, 2024, can now offer acres for re-enrollment. A producer can both enroll new acres into Continuous CRP and re-enroll any acres expiring September 30, 2024. FSA water quality practices, such as riparian buffers, prairie strips, grassed waterways, and wetlands, will receive an additional 20% incentive. Buffer practices have a positive impact on water quality. Additionally, the Climate-Smart Practice Incentive launched in 2021 is also available in the Continuous signup. SAFE provides an opportunity to develop grassroots cooperative conservation projects to address high priority wildlife needs through habitat restoration. The practices must be used to address wildlife habitat that can be enhanced through the restoration of eligible cropland through CRP. Enrollment is available under continuous and general signup criteria, depending on the practice and cover being established. McLean County is now a SAFE area that allow landowners and producers to qualify for a range of wildlife practices that can be enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program SAFE CP38.

LAND AND LANDOWNER ELIGIBILITY

- Land with a current cropping history with the Farm Service Agency from 2012-2017
- Crop must have been reported 4 of the 6 years within this range
- Landowners must meet the Adjusted Gross Income "AGI" requirement
- Fields must be a minimum of 10 acres or greater
- Contracts begin October 1st of a program year. Contracts can be pro-rated.

No-Till Drills, Broadcast Seeders, and Tree Planter Available for Rent

Three no-till drills, a three-point broadcast seeder, a tree planter, and multiple hand/UTV broadcast seeders are available for wildlife habitat installation in McLean County. Some of these pieces of equipment were purchased in cooperation with Illinois DNR through Habitat Stamp funds raised by Illinois Hunters. Reporting of habitat installation is required to maintain records of the acres installed. Equipment is owned by the McLean County Pheasants Forever Chapter. A rental agreement, and Pheasants Forever membership is

- Three Point attachment for broadcast seeder or Tree Planter required
- A 2" ball for transport (35mph max speed) of Tree Planter, already on a trailer
- Tree Planter is capable of planting up to 4-5' bare root trees
- PTO required for broadcast seeding.
- Trailer or pick-up bed required to transport of Three Point Broadcaster

DESCRIPTIONS

Although these plants are for conservation purposes only and shall not be used as ornamentals or for landscaping (SWCD Act), landowners living in urban areas are encouraged to plant these species as they can provide wildlife habitat, shade, windbreaks, or erosion control.

TREES & SHRUBS

American Redbud: Medium growing rounded deciduous broadleaf tree. Good fall colors, purplish pink flowers in early spring. H:15-25' W:10-20' Full sun to partial shade.

Red Pointe Maple: Medium growing broadly pyramidal deciduous broadleaf tree. Dark green leaves turn brilliant red in fall. H: 40-45' W: 25-30' Full sun.

Green Mountain Maple: Medium growing pyramidal broadleaf tree. H: 50' to 70'; W: 35' to 40'. Orange, red, and yellow fall color. Desirable drought resistance variety. Full sun.

Bur Oak: Medium growing rounded deciduous. Turns golden yellow in fall. Large stately landscape specimen. H: 50-100' W: 34-45' Full sun.

American Dream Swamp White Oak: Medium growing rounded deciduous. Good golden fall color. H:40-50' W: 30 -40' Full sun.

Eastern White Pine: Grows in average, medium, well-drained soil. Prefers full sun, fertile soils and cool, humid climates. Rapid growing, long-lived, needled evergreen. H:50-80' W:20-40'

Colorado Blue Spruce: Grows in average, acidic, medium moisture, well-drained soils in full sun. Tolerates some light shade. Medium to large, narrow, pyramidal conifer. H:30-60' W:10-20'

Norway Spruce: Large, evergreen coniferous tree. Prized for blue-green needles color and excellent landscape form. H:50-125' W:20-45'

Black Hills Spruce: Slow growing pyramidal coniferous evergreen tree. Dark green color. Stays tight and neat. H: 15-20' W: 8-15'

Red Osier Dogwood: Medium growing upright deciduous broadleaf shrub. White to bluish berries in late summer, brilliant red twigs glow in winter. H: 5-6' W: 5-6'

American Plum: Medium growing rounded deciduous broadleaf tree. Native to Illinois, produces small plums in July-August that are high value to wildlife. H: 10-20' W: 15-25'.

Serviceberry, Lamarckii: Medium growing rounded deciduous shrub. Produces white flowers in the spring along with berry-like fruit in the summer. H:15-25' W: 15-25'

Monarch Mix: Contains 32 flowering species. For full details on this mix, go to mcleancountyswcd.com/monarchs



Tree Protector: This is a 2 or 4 foot vinyl sheet tree protector that wraps around the base of the tree with included zip ties and included wooden stake.



The SWCD provides many conservation services to the public. Our tree and fish sales are held annually in both the spring and fall. Farmers and landowners can apply for conservation cost-share dollars and access federal program possibilities. In partnership with the McLean County Pheasants Forever Chapter, we offer access to three no-till drills, a three-point broadcast seeder and a three-point tree planter for habitat installation. McLean County Conservation Cost-share Projects

Partners for Conservation funds are available for conservation installation that will conserve soil and benefit water quality. This funding pool is available on behalf of the McLean County Soil and Water Conservation District. The funds can be used for projects outside of current practices enrolled in an active government contract. Cost share is based on a practice component list that sets expectations for



average costs of installation. In 2023 funding in the amount of \$40,654.54 was allocated to McLean County landowners on 11 separate projects. The following practices and projects reflect those totals. Five projects impacting 564 acres for cover crop implementation, One project for the adoption of strip till impacting 178 acres, One project to decommission a well for a total of \$400, and finally four reconstructed waterway projects for a total of \$25,098.85. Applications are available at the office with a sign-up deadline before March 29, 2024.

Conservation Restoration Projects

The McLean County SWCD continues to provide valuable conservation restoration resources to farmers and landowners. Conservation grade tree sales, and pond stocking are two opportunities that diversify and protect our valuable local resources. The district promotes two sales each year, one in the spring and another in the fall to meet weather and planting conditions. Recommendations can be made by our office and other conservation professionals to meet the needs of the landscape and customer. An annual pond shocking demonstration is held to help educate pond



owners about deciding on various stocking rates, pond maintenance, and fish species. In 2023 the McLean County SWCD assisted the pond stocking of 70 local ponds, and worked with 110 projects to plant 2,202 trees and shrubs. Additionally, the no-till drills were utilized on 20 projects impacting 111 acres of conservation cover seedings.

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
